### NOTES FROM THE COMMITTEE

Since our last newsletter, there has been quite a bit happening at GVC.

#### Launch of our new Display

On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> of November, we launched our latest display called "Working Wheels". This display seeks to show the important part that vehicles of all sorts have played in our working lives.

We were delighted to welcome a display vehicles from the Victoria Police — Big thanks to Senior Seargent Luke Banwell from the Road Policing Section and police officers Nick Rose, Chris King and Rob Baggaley who delivered the vehicles.



The display begins with some beautiful vintage vehicles such as the Whitechapel Hooded Buggy, circa 1900, a 1905 De Dion and a 1910 Ford Model T All of these vehicles take us back to the earliest years when vehicles were just beginning to be used for business purposes.

As it moves through the years, we have emergency services and army vehicles being showcased next to vehicles such as an Indonesian Becak, trucks, tractors and a limousine.



There is even an appearance by the Mad Max Humongous machine.

John and Liz Britton have done an outstanding job in presenting a Hudson Hearse complete with the Funeral Director who would have been leading the

funeral procession and a group of mourners – well worth seeing.

And you just have to see Ness's lettuces!!!!

We wish to thank the Traralgon Historical Society for lending us their 1902 Curved Dash Oldsmobile and Old Gippstown for generously allowing us to display their Hudson Hearse

These displays don't just happen – they take a great deal of work from many of our volunteers. So, to all of you who have contributed in one way shape or form – A BIG THANKS – it is really appreciated.



#### **Projects**

Since our last Shed Chatter many smaller projects have now been completed including

- the updating of the front door,
- the lighting on the ramp together with the outside spotlights have now been fixed.
- the gutters have now been cleaned and the leak in the annexe fixed.
- We have now completed the audit of Loan and Model items with all documented and labelled.

The birds are giving us a bit of grief again and the smaller ones have worked out how to bypass the spikes that were put up. We are now looking at installing a "gizmo" that emits a noise designed to deter the pesky critters!

We have put in an application for funding to build a small Shed adjacent to the BBQ shelter. Vic Trak are still assessing the applications.


#### **HUGE CONGRATULATIONS TO HENRY NOBLE**

#### NOTICEBOARD FOR CARS FOR SALE

Our current display is:

Working Wheels, Cars That Moved People. One of the vehicles on display is an army truck, displayed by Paul Dekmetzian.

Mr Dekmetzian purchased and restored the 2.5 tonne International 4×4 cargo truck in 2014, from the family of previous owner and war veteran William Baird OAM. This truck was designed and built by the International /Harvester Co. Ltd. of Australia. It was built specifically for the Australian Defence Forces. It has the capability of carrying either stores or personnel over terrain that it was usually inaccessible to other forms of vehicles. Its role within the Armed Forces was as a medium general service cargo vehicle.

The unique history of 'Cargo', as the truck is fondly named, prompted Mr Dekmetzian to create a series of children's books to share the truck's life story and surrounding themes, in a bid to inspire some passion into future generations.

The first in a projected 12 book series, *The Adventures of Cargo the Army Truck* – *'Cargo Gets* a *New Job'*, details the truck's transition from humble beginnings in a Dandenong factory, to a loyal community service vehicle.

Under Mr Baird's care, **Cargo** spent 15 years servicing the isolated New South Wales communities of Hay and Ivanhoe. Its powerful frame and large tyres were perfect for tackling the unsealed, often boggy dirt roads, of the rural townscape. Before that, between 1963 and the early 1980s, it was used throughout Australia's involvement in the Vietnam Conflict.

After Mr Baird's passing, the truck was stored in a shed until Mr Dekmetzian came along and gave Cargo a new lease on life. Part of the Victorian Military Vehicle Corp (VMVC), Mr Dekmetzian said Cargo frequently catches the attention of young ones when it is displayed at VMVC shows.

"The kids go crazy," he said.

"When we show it, we drop the tailgate and roll up the canvas and there's seats in the back. The little ones go right to the back, and they don't want to come out."

Mr Dekmetzian said he wanted to create a fun and light-hearted book to share an important part of Australia's military history.

"The way I'm writing the books is, so it's as interesting for the reader reading it, as it is for the children listening to it," he said.

"Once my generation passes eventually, unless the kids are interested in [military vehicles] and excited by them, there won't be much interest in them, say after 20 to 30 years," he said.

"The books are meant to maintain that interest and enjoyment, and hopefully some young people start buying these and driving them around in the future. Who knows?!"

Mr Dekmetzian's passion for army vehicles goes back to the 1970s, when he entered the Australian Army as a school cadet aged 17. After finishing high school, he became part of the Monash University regiment.

"I was in the driving platoon, and I used to drive similar vehicles all over the place," he said.

Cargo is the second army truck in his collection. In 1981 he left the Army to pursue a career in banking, but maintains the experience affected him "in a very positive way."

"From 1973 to 1981, eight years of my young life, I was involved in the army...and it's taught me a great deal," he said.

"The army has a specific way of training people. You'll learn to keep things clean, how to keep things maintained, how to be disciplined and how to get on with the job."



Another vehicle on display is Ken Tate's 1951, Lincoln Cosmopolitan, Long Wheelbase.

#### Background information:

A stately full-size luxury car, the Cosmopolitan from Lincoln was the type of car to chauffeur presidents. Introduced in 1949, the all-new post war Cosmopolitan was produced until 1954. One of them was built for Harry S Truman. It included integrated running boards, specifically for the Secret Service agents to ride on.

Based on a regular Cosmopolitan sedan, the Limousine was modified heavily and featured a variety of luxury features. Specially designed for U.S. President Harry S. Truman, the Cosmopolitan Limousine sported gold plating, letter desks, and reading lights. Incredibly modern for the day and time, the vehicle featured two-way intercom between the driver and passengers and full power windows, which could be completely controlled from the President's seat.

Only 18 of these unique models were built. Nine models were sent to the White House and eight travelled around the U.S. to places Truman often visited. It was also used by Truman's successor, Dwight Eisenhower who added a distinct "bubbletop". Presidents John F Kennedy and Lyndon B Johnson also used the Lincoln until its retirement in 1967. It truly was a "working car".

The car on display was only recently acquired by Ken from an importer from Queensland. Not much is known about its history, but it is very similar to the one that would have chauffeured Presidents around the U.S.

#### Mt Tarrengower Historic Hillclimb, Maldon

It is run by the Bendigo Car Club in conjunction with Vintage Sports Car Club and the Historic Motorcycle Racing Association of Victoria. These hillclimbs have been running on and off since 1928. It has been run in this form since 1979.

Mt Tarrengower is recognised as the longest Hillclimb in Australia being 1.6km long and rising almost 182metres from start to finish.

The cars competing ranged in age from 1917 Ford Model Ts up to a 1987 Ford Falcon XI.

The motorcycles competing ranged from a 1936 Indian Sports Scout 750cc to a range of 1972 motorcycles including, a Suzuki GT 250, and a Honda CB 350cc. It was an interesting and exciting event to watch. Look out for it next year, it will be great weekend away. It is usually on the second weekend of October.



#### Vintage Vehicle Run

The November 4, Vintage Vehicle Run, was well attended. Most cars started at "The Shed" and were then joined by several happy folk at the old Sale Police Station.

John Franklin came down from Drouin with his 1920s roadster. He was joined by David Canavan (a 1929 Model A Ford), Peter Johnson's 1929 Dodge Coupe and Noel and Cheryl Hedington in their 1925 Oldsmobile Tourer. There followed a Morris, an Austin, a Vauxhall, a Fiat, a Chrsysler and a Buick and the mighty Chevy Corvette. We were all happy to see the Land Cruiser with the rescue trailer fall in behind.

Leigh set off along South Gippsland Highway and then turned off to follow the narrow roads in the Ninety Mile Beach hinterland, yet another amazing area in this scenic jewel we know as Gippsland.

We were met head on by a column of 26 Model T Fords, all waving and honking their klaxons as they passed by.

After a brief stop to rest the cars and stretch our legs, we headed to Tarraville, once described as a 'most disreputable place', to see the old wooden church. It is the second oldest wooden church in Victoria and is a great example of slab construction, using



wooden slab planks and no nails. A church elder gave us a talk about the building and its history. The church is still used today, for Sunday services, weddings, and funerals. The bright blue and white paint belies the 167-year-old building. It contains a bell tower, which still has a working bell in it which a few of us tested, while the more accomplished musos had a tinkle on the old bellows pump organ.

We set off for Port Albert, and lunch at the famous fish shop. The main street was bustling with locals and visitors. The CFA was having an open day, and our procession only added more colour and interest, with heads turning to look as the shiny vehicles passed by.

The weather had been threatening rain all morning, so we sat in inside the café to enjoy our fish and chip lunch, during which time, Leigh moved around our tables to chat about the interesting history of the area.

Leigh had organised for us visit the Historic Swing Bridge on our journey home, south of Sale. All cars behaved, along with their drivers, and we had a sedate run all the way to



the bridge, where we met up with the Model T Ford Club, from Melbourne.

Small groups formed and we all took an interest in each other's pride and joy. and ourselves with re-acquainted several familiar faces.

Shortly before 3pm, a council operator arrived to open the bridge, and the 111year-old wooden boat "Rubeena" glided quietly up and down to the delight of passengers.



Although the bridge is now operated hydraulically, there is still some manual prep work to be done first. Eventually the old bridge began to slowly rotate, swinging its impressive tonnage until it was lying parallel to the banks, allowing large vessels, and yachts with masts to pass safely either side. It was such a wonderful achievement for engineers 140 years ago. I imagine it would have been a huge challenge to build the structure originally, considering the foundations were out in mid-stream. It was an enjoyable way to finish our day, and time to head off on our individual journeys home. The Land Cruiser and trailer were not called upon, which was great - no breakdowns. The day was a ten out of ten adventure. Thanks to all participants, especially to Leigh who led all day in his Willys Jeep.






